

EXHIBITOR INFORMATION

PREMIUMS WILL BE PAID AS ADVERTISED IF FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE

All stalls and Pens Will be Assigned

1. The Champaign County Fair reserves, to its Board of Directors, the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to settle arbitrarily and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to the Fair.
2. While the Fair Association will give adequate police protection and take such precautionary measure as are consistent in the operation of the Fair, The Fair Board and Champaign County Fair Association will not be responsible to any person, individual, corporation or association for any loss by either fire, theft, or personal injury sustained by anyone through the negligence of any person or group of persons, exhibits or exhibitors.
3. The Directors of the Fair Association reserve the right to cancel the Fair and withdraw all premiums offered should unforeseen circumstances occur which, in the judgment of the Directors, would make it advisable to do so, and all premiums offered and contracts made shall be null and void.
4. Each livestock exhibitor must furnish his own buckets for watering and his own feed.
5. Exhibitors of livestock must keep the stalls in a neat and clean condition, and space over which visitors will pass in examining stock free from waste and rubbish. All stalls and pens must be cleaned before 8 a.m. each day and refuse disposed of as Superintendents may direct. **BEDDING: Wood Shavings and Sawdust Acceptable ... NO WOOD CHIPS.**
6. All entries once made are final. There will be no refunds given on entries made in error by exhibitor or his agent.
7. **NO FAN WITH MOTOR EXCEEDING 1/4 H.P. WILL BE PERMITTED.**
8. Exhibitors are requested to take ample time to arrange their exhibits. During the Fair every precaution will be taken by the Fair Association to protect exhibits, but the Fair will not be responsible for loss or injury should any occur.
9. All protests concerning entries of any department must be made in writing, accompanied by an affidavit setting forth the grounds for protesting. Protests concerning the exhibition of entries must be filed with the Management at least twenty-four (24) hours before the awards are made, and such protests will be considered before the hour of the showing. All protests against a judge's decision must be made in writing and accompanied by cash deposit of \$50.00. Such deposit will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. The protest must state plainly the Cause of Complaint of Appeal and must be filed with the Manager within five hours after the award has been made, it being considered that the award was made when entry book is signed. No Complaint or Appeal based on the statement that the Judge or Judges are incompetent or have overlooked an animal or article will be considered by the management. All questions of dispute or differences not provided for under these rules shall be referred to the Board of Directors, whose decision shall be final. In accordance with state aid regulations, no tie awards can be given for any premium offered.
10. **Feed and Forage:** Exhibitors will be permitted to bring into the grounds only a limited amount of feed, hay or straw, and the management reserves the right to refuse admission of such if, in their judgment, there is an excessive amount. The space in the barns is for exhibition purposes and not for storage of feed. Grooming chutes will not be allowed in the barns.
11. **Superintendents:** Each Superintendent or Chairperson will have complete charge of the arrangement and supervision of articles or animals on exhibition to his department or class in accordance with the rules of the Fair and under the direction of the General Livestock Superintendent and the Board of Directors. They will accord the awarding judge facility for examination, will affix the premiums under the direction of the judge, will take charge of entry books, and the awards must be entered in plain, legible manner, in proper place, as the premiums will be paid on these entries. No premium will be awarded unless the competing animal or article is properly entered through the Champaign County Fair Association Office, according to the rules of the Association.

CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION—

TO LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS RECEIVING AND VETERINARIANS FILLING OUT FORM M-120

Instructions for completing form M-120 for County and State Fairs. The numbers listed below correspond to the numbers on the sample form. All blocks **MUST BE COMPLETED!**

1. Name (owner and farm name) and complete mailing address.
2. Name of show (i.e. Illinois State Fair, various county fairs, etc.)
3. *Number of animals in shipment **MUST BE LISTED** and **CORRESPOND TO THE NUMBER OF ANIMALS LISTED BELOW.**
4. Mark (X) a species (more than one species may be listed).
5. Mark (X) the purpose of movement.
6. Herd or Flock Status. List the herd number of the appropriate species when applicable.
- 6a. Last test date. List the last test date for the herd number listed.
7. Record any vaccines and/or treatment to an animal and the withdrawal time.
8. **LIST ALL FORM OF IDENTIFICATION!** When an animal has more than one form of identification (i.e. metal eartag and an ear tattoo), list them all.
9. Registry Name. List registration numbers and names.
10. Record the age of the animal.
11. Record the sex of the animal.
12. Record the breed of the animal.
13. Test information. When testing is required for a species the test date, laboratory name and test results **MUST BE LISTED** on the health certificate.
14. Record the calthood vaccination symbol when applicable.
15. Date issued **MUST BE COMPLETED OR** the health certificate **WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.**
16. Date inspected must be completed.
17. Signature of Accredited Veterinarian **MUST BE COMPLETED OR** the health certificate **WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.**

NOTE: Any corrections (test information, date issued, identification, etc.) **OR** any animals added to a health certificate **must be done by and signed by the issuing veterinarian.** Any corrections or animals added without the issuing veterinarian's signature will not be accepted. Veterinarian's initials will not be accepted.

2010 EXHIBITION LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS
COUNTY FAIRS

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

- Exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with all rules applicable to their exhibits.
- All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.
- All animals except as noted, shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) which shows that the animal meets all health requirements for the State of Illinois. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection shall be made available to Bureau of Animal Health Personnel on request. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection means a legible record made on an official form of the state of origin which has been issued, signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian and which shows the name and address of the animal's owner or exhibitor and the results of all required tests or vaccinations. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall list only one animal identification per line; shall be presented on the form on which it was initially issued; and shall not be corrected, changed or altered in any manner.
- All animals shall be officially identified. The animal(s) official identification shall be recorded on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated herds, the identifying herd number(s) along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for out-of-state livestock shall be void thirty(30) days after issuance.
- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for Illinois-origin livestock shall be void ninety (90) days after issuance.
- All livestock shall be subject to examination upon entry to any Illinois Fair or exhibition. Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall be immediately withdrawn and held in quarantine at the owner's risk and expense until properly treated and recovered, or until the animal is released to return to the owner's premise. Any livestock infected with scabies, mange, active lesions of ringworm, soremouth, or multiple warts which are easily visible without close examination shall not be permitted to exhibit and are subject to quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds. Sheep and goats with caseous lymphadenitis as evidenced by draining abscesses shall not be exhibited and are subject to immediate quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
- Illinois Department of Agriculture personnel or designee may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois Fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs or banned substances. New examination techniques, such as ultrasound, may also be used at anytime while the animals are on the grounds of any Illinois Fair or exhibit. The Illinois Department of Agriculture or designee may collect urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.
- All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois Fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animals(s) will be excused from exhibition and ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited. Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, shall constitute a violation of show rules and may result in the animals disqualifications and removal from the fairgrounds.
- Any Illinois cattle, bison, cervidae or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated from the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days post-entry.

CATTLE

DAIRY CATTLE HEALTH CERTIFICATES WILL BE CHECKED SUNDAY, JULY 25 at 5:30 p.m. Failure to comply will prohibit exhibition.

BEEF: HEALTH CERTIFICATES WILL BE CHECKED SUNDAY, JULY 25 at 6:00 p.m. Failure to comply will prohibit exhibition.

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be either a fully healed and legible tattoo, official metal ear tag, registration number (can only be used if the tattoo is recorded on the registration certificate or for breeds where pictures are acceptable), or individual brands, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate.

Illinois Cattle*Brucellosis*

Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State.

Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Illinois cattle.

Please Note: Illinois steers and calves under 6 months of age are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Out-of-State-Cattle**Permit**

1. All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit.

2. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.

Brucellosis

1. Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of

the following:

A. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.

B. Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.

C. Animal originated from a "Class Free" state (if entire state is so classified)

D. Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.

2. The negative brucellosis test shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days prior to exhibition.

Tuberculosis

1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States

A. No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when accompanied by a CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.

2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)

A. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.

B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to additional tuberculin test conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition.

C. Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60-120 days from the last official TB test date.

SWINE

LIVESTOCK HEALTH CERTIFICATES WILL BE CHECKED SUNDAY, JULY 25 at 5:30 p.m. Failure to comply will prohibit exhibition.

Illinois Swine*Identification*

1. Swine shall be identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.

2. Ear notch identification is acceptable for barrows, crossbred gilts and breeding swine. (Ear notch identification of crossbred swine does not satisfy USDA identification requirements for brucellosis and pseudorabies testing.) *Brucellosis*

Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine. *Pseudorabies* **All exhibition swine are required to be tested for pseudorabies as described below. (Illinois Swine Disease Control and Eradication Act, Section 105.110)**

1. Swine of all ages shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition; or swine shall originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.

2. Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.

Additional Requirements

1. Swine consigned to terminal market classes must meet the same test requirements as exhibition swine if these classes are held in conjunction with "exhibits not intended for slaughter".

2. When terminal classes are held on a day when no other livestock are present, these animals are exempt from all test requirements and do not need a CVI. All swine terminal classes

must be identified by a site tattoo prior to movement to slaughter.

3. Swine from pseudorabies-quarantined herds are not allowed to exhibit regardless of whether or not the show is terminal or non-terminal.

5. The Illinois and DuQuoin State Fairs are not classified as terminal shows.

Out-of-State Swine

Permit

1. All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit.

2. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.

Identification

1. Individually identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.

2. Ear notch identification is not acceptable for crossbred animals.

Brucellosis

1. Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:

A. Originate immediately and directly from a brucellosis free herd.

B. Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.

2. Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.

Pseudorabies

All exhibition swine are required to be tested for pseudorabies as described below.

1. Swine shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the past thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.

2. Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.

3. The Illinois and DuQuoin State Fairs are not classified as terminal shows.

SHEEP

LIVESTOCK HEALTH CERTIFICATES WILL BE CHECKED SUNDAY, JULY 25 at 5:30 p.m. Failure to comply will prohibit exhibition.

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo, official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provide the reader. Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal. When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

Market Lambs

All wethers must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

Illinois Sheep

1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.

2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Sheep

1. All out-of-state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.

2. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.

3. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

GOATS

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo, official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader. Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal. When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database. Ears should be used for tattooing when possible. If there is no space in the ear, the flank or tail fold may be used.

Illinois Goats

1. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon completion of an approved herd plan.

2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Goats

1. All out-of-state goats are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.

2. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.

3. Tuberculosis- Goats from areas or states that are not Accredited Bovine Tuberculosis Free, must be accompanied by a CVI indicating that the goats originated from a herd where a complete negative herd test has been conducted within the past twelve (12) months and the individual animals are negative to a tuberculin test conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

HORSES, PONIES, MULES AND OTHER EQUINE

Illinois Equine

1. All horses and other equidae, twelve (12) months of age and older attending an advertised equine event, shall be accompanied by a Negative Test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.

2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted. 3. An advertised equine event means a show, rodeo, sale, auction, exhibition, trail ride, or horse fair that is posted or media promoted. A CVI is not required for Illinois equine.

Out-of-State Equidae

1. All out-of-state equine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Permits are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling (217) 782-4944.

2. All horses and other equidae entering Illinois that are twelve (12) months of age or older, shall be accompanied by a Negative Test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.

3. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted. All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within thirty (30) days prior to entry.

The Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act prohibits physical mistreatment of animals. The uses of electrical shock, OR manual striking of any animals, OR withholding feed and water are considered violations of this Act. The presence

of any type of equipment to induce electrical shock in the exhibition area will be considered as intent to inflict electrical shock on animals under care of the person with the equipment. Persons found mistreating any animal shall be prohibited from exhibiting and be dismissed from the fairgrounds.

POULTRY

1. All entries (except waterfowl, i.e. domesticated fowl that normally swim, such as ducks and geese) in a show or exhibition shall have originated from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent hatchery or flock OR have a negative Pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition. Exhibitor shall show proper information as to name and address of owner or exhibitor, name and address of the authorized testing agent, date of the testing and the number, breed, and species of those tested.

2. Prior to being used to transport poultry to a show, all crates, boxes, containers and vehicles shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.

3. Any poultry vaccinations must be performed at least 4 weeks prior to delivery to the show.

4. Upon admission to a show, all entries shall be examined by the official county fair veterinarian or qualified state personnel who shall also receive and examine all certificates necessary for admission of birds to a show. Birds not in show condition will be excused from exhibition and removed from the premises. Any fowl showing signs of illness during the fair will be removed from the exhibition grounds.

5. All out-of-state turkeys must originate from flocks that are officially classified as U.S. Mycoplasma Gallisepticum Clean in accordance with the provisions of the National Poultry Improvement Plan or be negative to a test for Mycoplasma gallisepticum within 30 days prior to entry.

6. A permit is also required for out-of-state poultry. A permit maybe obtained by calling (217) 782-4944.

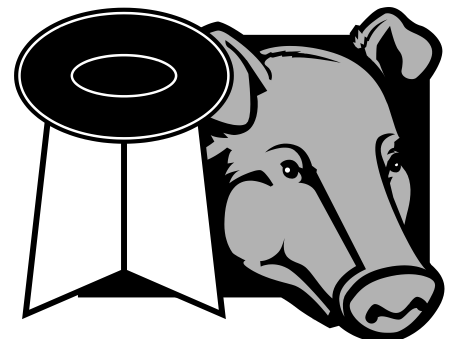
Please note: These poultry exhibition requirements do not apply to 4-H and FFA 1-day poultry shows where the entries are taken to the show and returned home the same day. However, a permit is required for out-of-state poultry.

CERVIDAE

(Deer, Elk, Reindeer, Caribou, Moose, Red Deer and other Related Species)

Identification

All animals shall be individually identified with an approved tag, microchip or tattoo. Elk are required to have two official/approved unique identifiers.



Illinois Cervidae

Chronic Wasting Disease

For cervidae changing ownership or moving within the State, the owner must obtain a permit issued by the Department prior to movement and the cervid must originate from a herd that is enrolled in the Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) Program or the Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Program. The permit shall be obtained no more than 72 hours in advance of the movement of the cervids by providing the following information:

A) Name and complete mailing address of person exhibiting the cervids;

B) Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease or Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Herd number;

C) Name and complete mailing address of location where the animals will be exhibited;

D) Number of animals and unique identification of the animals.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Illinois cervidae.

Out-of-State Cervidae

Chronic Wasting Disease

1. All cervidae entering Illinois must be in compliance with the Illinois Wildlife Code [520 ILCS 5]. For more information, contact the Illinois Department of Natural Resources at 217/782-6384.

2. All cervidae entering Illinois must be accompanied by a permit from the Department and a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that:

a. has been issued by an accredited veterinarian of the state of origin or aveterinarian in the employ of the United States Department of Agriculture;

b. is approved by the Animal health Official of the state of origin;

c. shows that the cervidae are free from visible evidence of any contagious, infectious or communicable disease or exposure thereto, do not originate from a CWD endemic area (any county and surrounding counties where CWD has been diagnosed in the past five years);

d. shows that the cervidae are not originating from a herd under quarantine for any contagious, infectious or communicable disease;

e. shows that the animals originate from a herd that has been monitored for at least 5 years under a state-approved CWD certification program.

3. A permit number can be obtained by calling (217) 782-4944. Applicant for permit shall furnish the following information to the

Department:

a. Name and post office mailing address of Illinois destination;

b. Name and post office mailing address of the consignor and/or source herds;

c. Number and post office mailing address of the herd veterinarian;

d. Number and unique identification of cervidae in shipment.

Brucellosis

Elk six (6) months of age and older must have a negative brucellosis card or PCFIA test within sixty (60) days prior to entry.

Tuberculosis

1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States

All cervidae twelve (12) months of age and over shall be negative to two (2) single cervical test for bovine TB no less than ninety (90) days apart with

the second test conducted within ninety (90) days prior to entry. These animals shall be isolated from all other members of the herd during the testing period unless they originate from an accredited, qualified or monitored herd.

A. Cervidae from an accredited herd may be moved into Illinois without further TB testing provided that a certificate stating that such cervids originated from an accredited herd accompanies them.

B. Cervidae originating from qualified or monitored herds may enter with a negative test within ninety (90) days prior to entry and a certificate stating that the animals originate from a monitored herd.

2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)

A. All cervidae shall originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.

B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to two (2) additional tuberculin tests conducted within 180 and 30 days prior to entry or exhibition.

RATITES

(Ostriches, Emus, Rheas, Cassowaries and Kiwis)

Illinois Ratites

1. There are no requirements governing the movement of ratites within Illinois.

Out-of-State Ratites

1. Must be accompanied by a CVI and permit number.

2. Individually identified by legband or microchip.

3. Negative test for Avian Influenza within 10 days prior to entry.

PIGEONS

There are no requirements governing the movements of pigeons within or into Illinois.

RABBITS

There are no requirements governing the movements of rabbits within or into Illinois.

LLAMAS

There are no requirements governing the movement of llamas within Illinois. A permit and health certification is required for out-of-state llamas. A permit may be obtained by calling (217) 782-4944.

ENTRY INFORMATION

OPEN CLASSES

To be ELIGIBLE for competition, animals must be bonafide property of the exhibitor and registry certificate and certificate of ownership or transfer in their recognition breed association must be produced, showing the exhibitor to be the owner, and must be so registered thirty (30) days prior to the opening day of the Fair.

JUNIOR CLASSES

To be ELIGIBLE for competition in the Junior Show, all animals (i.e. individual, herd or flock) shown must be the property of boys or girls showing them and registered in their names only. Junior classes are open to boys and girls who are 8 years of age or in third grade and not yet 19 years of age on or before September 1 of the year previous to the fair. If the same animals are shown in both the Open and Junior Classes, they shall be shown under the SAME exhibitor's name (i.e father is not permitted to show an animal in the Open Class and the son/daughter the same animal in the Junior Show).

ENTRY DEADLINE - JULY 16, 2010, Friday - 5:00 p.m.

ALL livestock entries must be in the Fair Office or postmarked, by Friday July 16, 2010 by 5:00 p.m.

LIVESTOCK on GROUNDS

ALL livestock (Except BEEF) must be in place by 8:00 a.m., Sunday, July 25, 2010, and remain in place until Wednesday, July 28, 2010. Time of RELEASE will be at the conclusion of the Livestock Shows. Health Papers will be checked at 5:30 p.m.

All BEEF, must be in place by 6:00 p.m., Sunday, July 25, 2010, and remain in place until released, Wednesday, July 28, 2010, 6:00 p.m. Health Papers will be checked, Sunday, July 25, 2010 at 6:00 p.m.

ALL PUREBRED LIVESTOCK must have registration papers on fairgrounds.

ALL FIRST PLACE WINNERS will be checked at placing.

In any year for which the General Assembly of the State of Illinois fails to make an appropriation sufficient to pay such premiums, premium amounts may not be accurately reflected in this Premium Book.

Exhibitors are especially requested to fill in the number and breed of animals they are entering on the entry forms and to use a separate entry blank for each department entered.

All livestock (except BEEF) must be in place by 8:00 a.m., Sunday, July 25, 2010 and remain in place until Wednesday, July 28, 2010. TIME OF RELEASE WILL BE AT THE CONCLUSION OF LIVESTOCK SHOWS. Livestock, other than beef, will have Health Papers checked at 5:30 p.m. ALL BEEF must be in place by 6:00 p.m. Sunday, July 25, 2010 and remain in place until released at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 28, 2010. Health Papers for BEEF will be checked at 6:00 p.m. Sunday, July 25, 2010.

To be eligible for competition animals must be the bonafide property of the exhibitor and registry certificate and certificate of ownership or transfer in their recognition breed association must be produced, showing the exhibitor to be the owner, and must be so registered 30 days prior to the opening day of the Fair.

EXHIBITOR NUMBERS MUST BE WORN WHILE SHOWING IN THE RING OR EXHIBITOR WILL NOT BE PLACED

Animals must be in show ring 2 minutes after last call, in order to be eligible to be placed.

All entries in this department and premiums awarded, will be governed by the general rules in the front of this book. Limit of two (2) exhibitor tickets per exhibitor.

All exhibitors must purchase an exhibitor's ticket at the time of making entry. No Exceptions.

Members of one family may show individually owned animals in group classes.

ALL STALLS AND PENS WILL BE ASSIGNED

ALL CATTLE ARE SUBJECT TO EXAMINATION FOR UNETHICAL FITTING BY A COMMITTEE OF CAPABLE OFFICIALS AND ANY ANIMAL DEEMED UNETHICALLY FITTED WILL FORFEIT PREMIUM AWARD AND THE OWNER SHALL BE BARRED FROM EXHIBITING AT THIS FAIR IN THE FUTURE.

ALL CATTLE ARE SUBJECT TO BE MOUTHED FOR AGE, EITHER PRIOR TO EXHIBITION OR AFTER BEING EXHIBITED AND ANY ANIMAL DEEMED OVER AGE FOR THE CLASS IT IS EXHIBITED IN SHALL FORFEIT ALL AWARDS AND THE OWNER SHALL BE BARRED FROM EXHIBITING AT THE FAIR FOR THREE YEARS.

Exhibitor may enter as many exhibits as desired; however, not over two premiums will be awarded to any individual or group in any one class.

NO SHOWMAN WILL BE HONORED IN THE SHOW RING WHO DOES NOT HAVE A NUMBER TAG. THIS RULING WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED TO SEE THAT ALL EXHIBITORS HAVE THEIR HEALTH REGISTRATION PAPERS CHECKED. IT IS ALSO NECESSARY SO THAT THE SUPERINTENDENT CAN RECORD YOUR CORRECT EXHIBITOR'S NUMBER.

Where there is no competition or where only one exhibitor is entered animals will be awarded first.

LIMITED RV/CAMPER PARKING - LIVESTOCK AREA - RV/Camper permits must be purchased from the Fair Office prior to parking in the camping area. All permits must be visibly displayed on the RV/Camper at all times. Any vehicle parking in the camping area ("E") must have a permit, exhibitors can purchase only one vehicle permit, not an "A" & "E". If your camper has a tipout or awning and is over the allotted space of 15'x40' you will be charged for two spaces. RV/Camper cost is \$80 per space for four days. Fair attendant will be at the camping area from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., the lot will be padlocked at other times. You will be assigned a space for your use, campers may enter no earlier than Friday (10 a.m.) and power can be connected only by the Fair attendant. All RV/Campers must use their designated area. Violators will be towed.
